To engage the Open Source community and capitalize on innovations, DoD and VA will operationalize an Open Source Custodial Agent for iEHR by August, 2011. 3. To support the iEHR, DoD and VA will define and initially staff a program organizational structure and operational construct by March 31, 2012. 4. To obtain one of the infrastructure foundation elements for the iEHR, DoD and VA will award a contract for the iEHR Enterprise Services Bus (ESB) acquisition by January 31, 2012. 5. To support standard data models across DoD and VA, VA will begin mapping the VA Salt Lake City Health Care System to the Health Data Dictionary (HDD) by March 31, 2012. 6. To provide a shared environment for DoD/VA systems testing, DoD and VA will establish iEHR joint Development and Test Environment (DTE) by September 30, 2012.
